Hallmark Behavior Problems of Foster and Adopted Children

Foster and adopted children with multiple negative impacts often show behavior problems. And behavior problems are one of the chief reasons that foster and adoptive placements flounder or even fail. Listed below are most frequent behavior problems reported by foster/adoptive parents:'

- Lying and manipulation
- Defiance and disrespect
- Verbal and/or physical aggression
- Violation of family norms
- Tantrums
- Destruction of property
- Stealing
- Hyperactivity
- Curfew violation
- Running away
- Sexual acting out and sexual aggression
- Arrests and legal difficulties
- Suicidal behavior Fire-setting

The most prevalent problem behaviors reported by foster/adoptive parents are lying and manipulation. A close second is defiance and disrespect, which can be a "hot button" for many parents. All of the behavior problems listed above, except suicidal behavior, are classified as "externalizing" because they are directed outward (at others) and are observable. Verbal and physical aggression, for instance, are both externalizing problems because they hurt other people. Stealing, which deprives someone of a rightful possession, is also an externalizing behavior because it victimizes others. Defiance and disrespect are often "in your face" forms of misbehavior that are aimed at other individuals (often



"After School Activity for Attachment Disorder Kids & Teens 5-16

Head, Heart & Tails, in cooperation with Alaska Assistance Dogs and Alaska Attachment & Bonding Associates (AABA), will continue its therapeutic service dog training program for kids and teens with their parent or caregiver. This fun program addresses the following core needs: It helps children learn to bond with a parent or caregiver, to regulate emotions, to develop a sense of teamwork, and to experience healthy loving, touching, and hugging. The focus is to help the child or teen develop a better bond with their parent/caregiver as both learn and then teach commands to their dog; usually Golden Retrievers, Standard Poodles or Labrador Retrievers. Teams can train learn and train any of the 65 commands a service dog learns! The win-win aspect of this program is that the parent-child teams help train service dogs for Alaskans with disabilities and become contributing members to their community.

Following a summer break, the program will resume for three 5-week sessions, held once a week on Tuesdays from 4:30 – 5:30 pm. Start dates are August 6, September 24 and November 12. Class size will be 4 – 5 trainers. A parent or caregiver must attend with their child. There is no cost to the families. Training locations will vary, but all begin at the Mat-Su Animal Shelter (training room) off 49th State Street in Palmer.

Authority figures) and are difficult to ignore. Externalizing behavior problems are most often associated with placement struggles and disruptions.

You may find, in noting the above behavior problems, that your foster or adopted children show some or even all of these problems. If so, you may be interested in and benefit from a better understanding of what such behaviors stem from.

When problem behaviors appear, most foster and adoptive parents raise two main questions:

1. Why does my child act this way?

2. How soon will he/she stop?

The first question sends us looking for causes, reasons or underlying issues related to behavior problems. The second question speaks to the urgent need for change. Knowledge of the patters and underlying issues helps us to understand causes and design interventions that promote change.

Once we have figured out the behavior pattern, we are half way there. We understand "how" this behavior came about, but we still need to know "why" the behavior problem occurred. This second question ("why") targets the causes of, reasons for, or underlying issues behind the behavior. Understanding causes and issues allow us to address them with psychosocial interventions and treatment plans. In a very general way behavior problems are cause by or derived from multiple negative impacts (e,g, genetic defects, prenatal exposure to toxins, trauma, etc.) that have beset many foster and adopted children. But getting to more specific causes takes some digging, which often uncovers underlying issues.

Causes arise from nature and nurture: The big picture is that biological, social and psychological factors mix mingle and multiply, thus producing behavior problems. This is pretty straight forward cause and effect, but it fails to furnish specific information that would guide the development of interventions and treatment plans. This is where the identification of underlying issues comes to the rescue.

A growing body of research has pinpointed eight underlying issues related to behavior problems:

- Low self-esteem and a negative self-image
- Difficulty understanding (and complying with) rules
- Problems with keeping emotions in check
- Difficulty labeling and verbalizing feelings and needs
- Distrust and lack of expectation of protection by others
- Inaccurate reading of other's feelings and interpersonal situations
- Below-average mental flexibility and verbal fluency
- Poor planning and reasoning

Please note that some of these issues are biological and others are psychological. While perceptions and conclusions are a part of who children are at any given moment in time, the underlying issues are a more permanent fixture of children's personalities. As such, underlying issues are frustratingly slow to change even under ideal conditions. This may explain why the term benefits of foster and adoptive care are more like harvesting wood

From a grove of trees that was planted long ago than picking vegetables from this season's garden. The most enduring benefits of foster and adoptive care are usually born out of a long term commitment to these children.

Foster and adoptive parents can benefit from knowing what issues are going on inside their children. Knowing what the issues are ultimately aids foster parents in intervening in helpful ways.

Summary

The psychological dimension provides understanding of children's thoughts, feelings and actions. Broadly speaking, foster and adopted children's behavior problems relate to the multiple negative impacts they have suffered. More specifically, problem behaviors have meaning, which often relates to early caregiver relationships and the family from which children come. Foster and adopted children often develop a style of engaging that was adaptive in their dysfunctional family but is maladaptive in a good foster or adoptive home. Behavior problems can often be understood and addressed if we examine their related patters and underlying issues. If the child's thoughts and feelings about himself and the world around him can be understood through a correct interpretation of his behaviors, then we have taken a big step in the direction of helping him.
