Behavior with a Purpose

Typical Behavior Problems of Foster, Kinship and Adopted Children.

It may come as no surprise to helping professionals who work with foster, kinship and adopted children that as many as three out of four foster children and youth suffer from serious mental health problems. (1) Many of these same children have three or more psychiatric disorders. (2)

The most common diagnoses include:

- Reactive attachment disorder
- Post traumatic stress disorder
- Bi-polar disorder
- Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder
- Oppositional defiant disorder
- Conduct disorder
- Autistic spectrum disorders

The number of diagnoses Adoptive, Foster, or Kinship children carry seems to be positively correlated to the number of mental health professionals who have seen them. Over time they become, as one foster parent would say, "going through the gauntlet" over which of the array of assigned diagnoses is most accurate. While the debate continues, Adoptive, Foster, or Kinship parents are left to contend with the behavioral and emotional issues.

Work with foster, kinship, and adoptive parents (and their children and youth) confirms what studies have shown; many of their children struggle mightily with emotional and behavioral problems. And, to be candid, Adoptive, Foster or Kinship parents struggle to help their children. Many of these children show conduct problems which will not go away. These problems commonly include both externalizing and internalizing behavioral problems such as lying, stealing, hoarding food, anger outbursts, self-harm, sexualized behavior, bedwetting, and defiance.

As you might already know, these behaviors often relate to critical factors such as genetic predispositions, prenatal exposure to drugs and/or alcohol, maltreatment, and multiple moves in foster care. Looking at only one of a long list of associated behavioral problems (see Table 1). These include such things as low self-esteem, difficulty accepting affection, fighting, delinquent behavior, drug and alcohol abuse, self-harm, withdrawal, sleep problems, or poor coping skills.

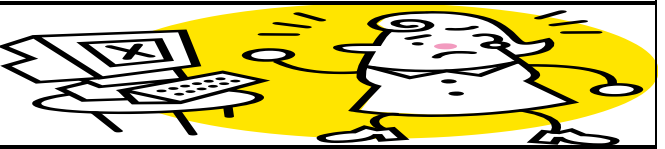

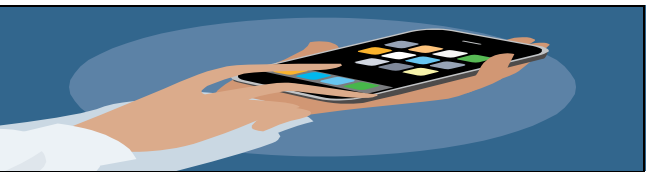

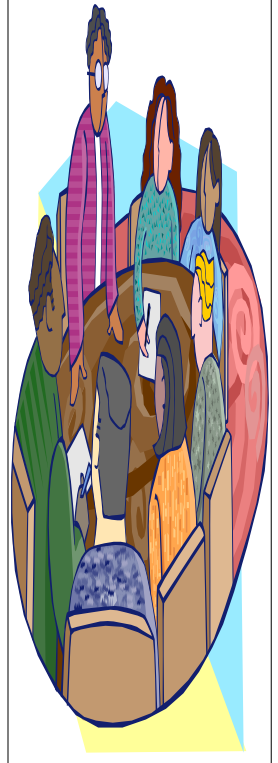

Table 1

Behavioral Problems of Neglected Children (3)

Neglected children, even when older, may display a variety of emotional and behavioral problems, including:

- Inability to control emotions, impulses, or temper outbursts
- Submissiveness
- Learning difficulties in school and problems with siblings or classmates
- Unusual eating or sleeping behaviors
- Fighting or soliciting sexual interactions
- Soliciting sexual interactions
- Social or emotions immaturity
- Unresponsiveness to affection
- Apathy or lethargy
- Lack of flexibility, persistence, or enthusiasm
- Helplessness under stress
- Poor coping skills
- Acting highly dependent
- Self-abusive behavior (e.g., suicide attempts or cutting themselves)
- Dissociative disorders, attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder, or posttraumatic stress disorder
- Engaging in sexual activities leading to teen pregnancy or fatherhood
- Low academic achievement
- Alcohol or drug abuse

Adoptive, Foster, or Kinship children and youth often suffer from significant emotional and behavioral problems. *How can parents and professionals help these kids? How can we help them their behavior problems?*

In short, help begins with a thorough assessment (medical, psychiatric, psychological, educational, etc.) aimed at understanding the child.

An assessment also needs to uncover why the behavior problems exist and/or persist. To accomplish this, parents and professionals may need to read between the lines and decode behavior for its underlying meaning. But, how can we as parents and professionals do that? Simply put, it helps to use a two step process; first, look at what is happening, and then ask why it is happening.

Step one: Look at what is happening. The first step zeroes in on exactly what is happening. The emphasis here is to observe the surface behavior and its structure. We ask; What does the problem consist of? How does it look to us? At this point we also consider whether the supposed problem is normal or abnormal.

We size up the behavior problem more precisely by asking some fairly standard questions which are, What, when, where, how often, and with whom? That is, what does the problem behavior consist of? When does the problem behavior occur? When does it happen? How frequently? With whom does the problem behavior occur?

Step Two: Look into why it is happening. The second step is an examination of why the behavior problem is happening. Specifically, after pinpointing the structure of the problem, we collect information on function.*

**Note; problem behavior typically serves some function, reason, cause, meaning, or motive or functions for individual. That is, it serves the child or youth in some fashion. Sometimes specific behavior problem can serve several different functions at once or over time. Alternatively, several behavior problems can serve a single function.*

Function encompasses the reasons for, causes of, and purpose behind the behavior problem. In a nutshell, an examination of function focuses on finding what lies beneath the surface behavior. We look at what produces it, what maintains it, and critically, how it serves the child. Sometimes there is a single, solitary function that a behavior problem serves. At other times, there are multiple functions associated with the behavior. Identifying the function of a behavior really amounts to generating a working hypothesis, a helpful hunch about why the problem exists.

Nine common functions found useful in assessment of why behavior problems may occur.

1. Attention
2. Asking for a need/want to be met
3. Fear or Phobia
4. Avoiding or Escaping
5. Reduce Anxiety/Pain
6. Provide stimulation/pleasure
7. Family issues
8. Physical/Medical
9. Cognitive distortion

Step Three: Testing our Hypothesis once we have a hunch about why a child has a behavior problem. We need to develop a strategy or approach to help the child. Once we have developed a working hypothesis or hunch about why a child acts the way he does, we can develop interventions to address the function, purpose, reason or cause.

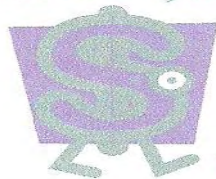

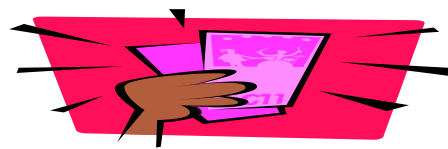
